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CAREER RESEARCH SPEECH—INTRODUCTION SCAFFOLD (1 Career)

<u>Directions</u>: The purpose of your presentation is to **INFORM** your audience **about your favorite career that you chose to research (top choice for what you want to do in the future)**. Follow this scaffold to write the main sections of your presentation—these sections will be cut out to create notecards to use during your speech.

INTRODUCTION:

The beginning of your presentation should **get your listener's attention** and **tell the audience which career you have chosen to present about**. Here are 5 ways to begin:

1) Ask a question and then answer it in an interesting way:

Have you ever read a book and wanted to change something about the plot or characters? One of the best things about being a book editor is having the power to suggest those types of changes! I decided to research the career of book editor because it involves one of my favorite pastimes: reading and responding to a wide variety of books.

2) Give a surprising fact and then tell how it relates to the career you researched:

Many students apply to work on their school's newspaper, yearbook, or literary magazine. These publications are not only fun, but they also provide great experiences if you're interested in becoming an editor or publisher. I am interested in the career of book editor because I like to read other's work and provide them with feedback and guidance. With the right touch, an editor has the power to make a good story into a bestseller.

3) Ask listeners to imagine something that could happen in the career:

We all know what it is like to have a friend or teacher find a spelling or editing mistake when we write. Imagine making one of these mistakes and having **thousands** of people read it. That's why a copy editor's job is so important. It is his/her job to find all the spelling, grammar, and punctuation errors before the writing is published. Because of my eye for detail, I think this would be a good career choice for me.

4) Tell an interesting anecdote or explanation on why you chose the career:

I love to read. In fact, I'll read anything from a forgotten advertisement to the label of a ketchup bottle. To me the perfect day involves a good book, a comfortable chair, and no interruptions! That is why I thought being a book editor would be the perfect career for me. I can't imagine anything better than being paid to read—something I enjoy doing in my spare time for free!

5) Repeat a famous quotation and then tell how it relates to the career:

Walt Disney said, "There is more treasure in books than in all the pirates' loot on Treasure Island...and best of all, you can enjoy these riches every day of your life." Like Mr. Disney, books have brought me a wealth of knowledge, experiences, and imagination. To me, there is nothing more inspiring than reading a good book and that's why I researched the career of a book editor.
