Course Description

This is the first semester of World History, so we will be covering events, which occurred between the years 500-1800. The main Lincoln Public School District standards we will be covering are:

Standard 1	European and Muslim Civilizations (500-1450) How did the development and interactions of European and Muslim civilizations lead to conflict and change?	
Standard 2	African and Asian Civilizations (500-1450) How did the development and interactions of African and Asian civilizations lead to conflict and change?	
Standard 3	 The Emergence of Modern Europe (1450-1750) How did the emergence of modern Europe change the world? 	
Standard 4	Exploration and Global Interactions (1450-1800) How did the exploration lead to global expansion and cross-cultural exchanges?	
Standard 5	 Enlightenment and Revolution (1750-1900) What political reactions resulted from new ways of thinking brought about by the Enlightenment? 	

In addition we will be incorporated elements of Big History into our World History class. You might ask: What is Big History? To state is simply, Big History attempts to answer the question "How did we get to where we are now?" by "examining the entire past of the Universe using the best available ideas from a variety of disciplines such as astronomy, chemistry, biology, and history". You can expect me to prepare classes that appeal to a variety of different learning styles. That means no one class will be the same as another. You can anticipate this course to have daily notes and in/out-of-class assignments, research projects, document analysis, written responses/papers, chapter quizzes, and unit tests.

Homework

You will receive homework in this class that reflects the objectives of this course, practices historical skills, and further develop our understanding of history and the world around us. Homework can be considered formative or summative. Formative assignments are ones that help you develop and practice knowledge, a skill, or a certain lesson/unit, i.e. in-class assignments, homework, and study guides, etc. Summative assignments are those that test your knowledge on a subject, i.e. quizzes, tests, and research projects.

All homework will have a due date depending on the assignment. Homework not turned in will result in a \underline{M} in the grade book. In order to get <u>full credit</u> of your assignments you must turn in your homework on time. Late homework will be deducted as shown below.

Homework Passes: You will be given 3 homework passes a semester. Homework passes allow you to "pass" on an assignment without penalty. If you do not use all or any of your homework passes during the semester, you may turn them in for extra credit at the end of the semester.

→ Note: There will be certain assignments that you may not use a homework pass on.

Classroom Procedures
